Learner's Corner

Acceptance Speech for 2016 Rochelle Hoffman Memorial Award winner **Lima Alexandrova**:

When my tutor told me that I won the Rochelle Hoffman Award I was amazed. I asked the question to myself, "Why me?" I have met so many nice and motivated people from other countries who also worked hard and have met goals and should win this award. I am so happy to be here right now and thankful to have this program.

I was born in Moscow. I have a friend who is living in the United States. The first time my husband and I came to America was about 15 years ago. We spent several summer times with our old friends. When we returned to Moscow we started thinking about our life and the future for our son. We decided that the best place for life is America. Especially Orange County. We thought we could get the best education for our son in the United States.

Our friends recommended us to try green card lottery. I never thought that it was a real chance to win. The chance was less than 1% to win this. But my husband completed applications and we won twice in one year. We felt so excited and shocked at the same time. We kept saying, "o Moй Eor ! o Moй Eor ! which means "Oh my God! Oh my God!" or the one I like in English: "Holy Cow!"

A year later in June 2013 we moved to Newport Beach from Moscow and the most important thing for us was learning English. We looked on the Internet for English lessons and the best place for us was the Newport Beach public library because we are living nearby. I came with my husband Miroslov and my son Boris. The first person we met was Cherall. She was very nice and kind and she was ready to help us. We completed our applications for the literacy program.

In September I started classes. I attended discussion with Shari Elias, Life skills with Seema Ali, conversation and cooking workshop with Marcia Drew, and Movie Talk with Cherall Weiss. I come to the library every day except Monday for a couple of hours.

It's useful to have an hour every week to talk, to learn new vocabulary to practice pronunciation, reading writing and life skills. TUTOR TIPS

Southern California Library Literacy Network recently held a tutor workshop at the Commerce Public Library for all literacy programs in the area. Former Literacy Coordinator, Jerry Edwards, prepared an excellent presentation on developing lesson plans. Some of his tips include:

- Make sure you know your focus (tutors know this as focus on the GOAL)
- Be prepared. It is comforting for the learner and truly helps the tutor
- Review previous lessons
- Practice basic skills
- Read and check comprehension at every session
- Write—modeling complete thoughts
- Read aloud—share something that demonstrates your passion for reading; why the passage makes you laugh or cry, etc.
