Learner's Corner About my Father

I'd like to tell you about my father. He had a quite hard but interesting life, and he passed away when he was 100 year old. His father (my grandfather) was a lawyer, he graduated from the Saint Petersburg University, and when the October revolution happened in 1917, he was the director of a factory in one of the southern towns of Russia.

The industry destroyed during the civil war in 1918 needed to be restored, so the New Economic Policy was announced. My grandfather was invited to work in Moscow as scientific secretary of the National Economic Supreme Council. In 1930, the prosecutions of so called "enemies of the people" began. In September 1930 he was arrested together with 48 of his coworkers, accused of sabotaging the food industry and executed. In 1957, 4 years after Stalin's death, he was exonerated posthumously as he was not guilty.

So, in 1932 my father was expelled from the University he was studying in as the son of an enemy of the people and exiled from Moscow with his mother. They came to Nizhny Novgorod where some distant relatives were living then. The relatives accommodated my father and my grandmother, which was in itself dangerous from them at the time. My father needed to check in with the KBG every two weeks. He was not allowed to attend college and had to work as a construction worker for two years. In 1932 he was allowed to study ship-building at the Polytechnic University, and after graduation began to work at the Central Ship Design Bureau, where he grew from an ordinary engineer to a department **Continued on Page 2** head.

He was working there until he was 86 years old. We immigrated to the USA when he was 90. During the last 10 years of his life in CA he visited NY, Las Vegas, Santa Barbara, San Francisco, Pittsburg in Pennsylvania, Boston, Montreal in Canada, and took a cruise to Mexico. He visited Moscow and our home town of Nizhny Novgorod in Russia. He studied English, learned how to work on the computer so he could at least read news and send and receive emails. He found many new friends here, so he lived a full and meaningful life.

He wanted to live to be 100 years old, and he succeeded. We celebrated his birthday on December 5,2011 with our family, relatives, and friends. There were more than 100 people at the party. And then we drank champagne via Skype with his colleagues from the Ship Design Bureau in Nizhny Novgorod. He loved people, and they loved him. Up to the end of his days he remained optimistic and completely reasonable person.

Career On-Line High School

Newport Beach Public Library and Newport/Mesa ProLiteracy have joined together to help adults in the area achieve their goal to obtain a High School Diploma.

The State of California has made the achievement of this goal a priority and is helping libraries to offer a specialized program called Career Online High School "COHS". Through a matching award program, students who complete a pre-requisite class are able to apply for a scholarship to complete their High School Diploma and receive certification in one of several career choices for example:

- Child Care and Education
- Certified Protection Officer
- Commercial Driving
- Homeland Security
- Office Management
- Customer Service
- Food and Hospitality

The basic curriculum includes completing credits in Language Arts, Math, Social Studies and Science. In fact, these credits can be transferred from the student's previous high school if completed in the past.

As COHS is a web-based program, it is a wonderful opportunity to give an adult the chance to get their High School Diploma in the convenience of their own home. If you know anybody that might benefit from this information, please pass it on.
