News for You provides up-to-date, easy-to-read news articles that help learners of all levels with their English reading, writing and speaking skills. All the articles are based on reports from respected news sources including the Associated Press and The Washington Post. The content is thoroughly reviewed by adult education professionals and editors to ensure accuracy, low-level readability and appropriateness.

Two Ways to Access News for You:

News for You articles are published every Wednesday. The online format also offers an audio version of the articles that be accessed from any device with internet.

We strongly recommend using this resource to help empower and engage your learners. Tutors also have access to a weekly lesson plan that goes over Word of the Week vocabulary and reading comprehension exercises, crossword puzzles, word search, polls and more.

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SCLLN Conference

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SCLLN Conference (continued)

The Newport Beach Library PAL program sponsored nine attendees for an informative networking event in Buena Park. Philanthropic souls gathered from across Southern California after a six year hiatus due to Covid. After a brief welcome speech, we split up to investigate "Getting Started with Writing," "Learner Leadership" or "Leading Engaging English Conversation Groups." Mollie Tammone led an inclusive and enlightening presentation. She asked us to write five or ten sensory words to describe various scenes. Asking us to recall sights, sounds, scents, actions, and colors. After browsing our words for only a moment, Mollie amazed the room by combining unlikely words such as the "rainbow of waves danced on top of the waterfall." Or "the beach felt alive with mumbling rocks." She showed us how a simple exercise, with random descriptive words, can turn in to a unique poetic story.

The second session offered a workshop on "Picking a Book You Will Love." Learners were especially captivated by Carrie Scott's valuable tools, such as asking a tutor or librarian to choose four or five books so the decision isn't too overwhelming. It's all about browsing books casually without pressure or time constraints. Trying out the five-finger technique; picking one page and counting the number of words you don't understand. If you get to five, it may not be the best book for you at this stage. Or another technique, such as requesting large print books which are easier to digest. Carrie welcomed feedback from many of the learners and encouraged us to have a conversation with our learner to find out how they would like to read together.

Our lunch and learn featured Regina Sells-Arnold from Azusa City Library whose program boasts over 200 members. With passion and fire, Regina invigorated the audience to reach out to friends, acquaintances, and even random strangers to tell them about our literacy programs. She recommended starting with an introduction, describing your program briefly, and closing with an open-ended question like "what do you think about helping change someone's life?" It was heartfelt and inspiring.

I am so grateful our Newport Beach PAL program offered me the opportunity to attend this wonderful event. Hopefully, more tutors and learners will attend future conferences.






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2024 Writer to Writer
