Today Tonight Tomorrow is a cute and innocent romance novel written by Rachel Lynn Solomon. The novel follows the main character, Rowan Roth, throughout her final day of her Senior year of highschool and her experience in Howl, a scavenger hunt like game the seniors play after school is over as a final goodbye to highschool which ends in the winner receiving a grand prize.

The novel is a romance between Rowan and her academic rival, Neil McNair. They have been rivals, competing against each other since the beginning of their freshman year to become valedictorian. As school ends and Howl begins, Rowan decides that she wants to beat Neil one more time before going off to college. As Rowan finds new discoveries during the game, she and Neil have to team up for the rest of the game, forced to spend time together.

I have heard mixed opinions about this novel from numerous people. I personally enjoyed reading this novel very much. It was a cute innocent romance as two people discover their true feelings for each other. It was very entertaining to read their banter and watch as their demeanor changed the more they interacted with each other. The entire novel takes place within 24 hours so it is somewhat of a fast paced novel. For the most part it is fluffy and innocent with only making out with the exception of one short scene. The short scene is kept somewhat vague with little details about what is happening. This novel was a great read to help me out of my reading slump, especially going into the new year, allowing me to want to read more books that are hopefully just as good as this one.

Although many people enjoyed reading this novel I have also heard negatives about it including the writing style and the overall characters in the novel. Although I personally had no problems with the characters I can see why some may find them annoying. I do feel there was a bit of an overuse with the F-word in the novel where it was a bit upsetting to me. I have no problem with language being used in novels however, there was no necessity to use the F-word in many of the conversations where it occurred, especially if there makes little to no difference in the sentence depending on whether the cuss word is used or not. There was also a lot of repetition in the topics that came up where they were constantly being brought up throughout the novel. There are no major critiques on items I would have changed but I do understand it can make quite a bit of a difference to other readers.

Overall, this novel was enjoyable with its innocent academic rivals to lovers' romance and the action in the events taking place in the novel. I would recommend this novel to anyone looking for a rival to lovers' romance who does not mind a bit of repetition in the topics that do come up throughout the novel.
